

Let The Adventure Begin....



Teaching Team Reflection

Exploring the outside world beyond our kindergarten gate provides the opportunity for children to participate in a shared experience. It is experiences such as our adventure today that fosters confidence, independence, curiosity, resilience and a love of learning. For some children this was their first visit to our mountain and for others it was the opportunity to re-visit a familiar experience and build on prior learning. We need to be very mindful of how much screen time (television, iPads and tablets) our children are being exposed to, and to think wisely about the experiences we provide for children. We believe it is important for the adults (parents and teachers) in a child's life, to foster an interest in experiences that promote their physical well-being and skills. Research suggests if children develop an interest in the early years then physical activity will be a habit of mind, a natural part of their everyday world and this is a good thing. The simple joy of roly poly stimulates children's vestibular system (is situated in the inner ear) and assists in the development of their balance and spatial awareness. Children of all ages need daily stimulation of the vestibular system and that is why exploration in the outdoors is so vital for young children.

A love of nature will also ensure children will continue to look after and take care of natural environments, such as our mountain. Maori call this kaitiakitanga, which means guardianship and protection and is based on how Maori view the world.

It was lovely to have such wonderful family participation and your involvement ensured a successful experience for all. Thank you for joining us on our adventure. We hope you had fun, we did!
