This Maōri proverb talks about co-operation and the combination of resources to get ahead.

I noticed that you waited patiently until he was finished then you would feed him another mouthful of yoghurt. Le 'arna you persevered with Leve until he had eaten all his yoghurt. He was then ready to play again. He kaiawhina pai koel You 're such a great helper Le 'arna! Its great that you are using past knowledge/ Maturanga o mua and skills to help care for your little cousin at kindergarten. When I talk to Nanny, she tells me that when you are with her, you help look after him and keep on eye on him. Your teachers have also observed you sharing your caring skills by taking responsibility for younger tamariki and pepe at kindergarten. Wow Le 'arna you are becoming a leader.

You have often displayed being persistent and *aro/*taking responsibility in other stories that are in your profile. Ka pai, you are challenging yourself as a learner Le 'arna. We will be mindful of where this will take you next.


Sometimes your Mum stays with you and now and then your Dad Manu takes some time off work and comes in with you.

Le'arna, how cool it is that you get to se your big sister Raiha when she comes over to kindergarten with Mr. Sanderson's class for "Open Gate Day"


When I saw you two you were having a lovely time doing some Art Work together, and it was good to see the two of you working together so happily. Aren't you just so lucky to have your whānau so close?

## A Repeating Pattern with the Blocks

16th July 2012

Le'arna I found you busily working away with the blocks. You were using two different shapes. I asked you if you knew what shape they were and you said 'square and rectangle'. Tino pai, you know your shapes. I spoke with your Nan and she also is amazed at how clever you are with shapes.

The way you made your tower by putting one square down and then one rectangle on top is called a repeating pattern. You were thinking and concentrating while choosing which block to use next.


You stood beside the finished block tower and it was a little wobbly, so you started again and changed the order of the blocks around. You are a great problem solver Le'arna. By changing the blocks you were creating an idea and trying out a new strategy. Through changing and discovering ideas you are making your learning meaningful and personal to you. Caryll said in her learning story that you are a 'quiet achiever' and I would have to agree.

Me aha ina ka... /What would happen if... you added another shape next time.

#### **EMPOWERMENT—WHAKAMANA**

Le'arna by playing with the blocks today you were using your own ideas to develop knowledge and skills in the area of mathematics. You made a repeating pattern with the blocks and identified the shapes of the blocks. You were making your own decisions and judgment as to how high your tower could go and problem solving/Wananga haere when it became unstable.







# 16 Mama

September 2012

Today I noticed that Le'arna you were interested in constructing a picture with some beautiful angels. I saw you cut out the angels with some scissors and paste them onto some paper. When this wonderful construction was completed I saw you print your name on the top left hand corner. I was so impressed with your mahi that I took a photo of you and your picture. I can see that working independently is important to you as you are able to finish all your mahi without help from anyone. Le'arna you are taking responsibility and ownership for your own learning. What a wonderful ability you have for being resourceful and setting goals for yourself.

I have been looking back through your pukapuka mahi and your previous mahi shows that you are able to express yourself creatively and that you show great concentration in all your mahi. This ability and strength to use your gifts of creativity in your paintings and constructions is evident and shows how you are extending yourself in each new endevour.

Ka wani ke Le'arna. A great effort that is rewarded with self knowledge and a continuing ability to obtain new skills while you are at play.
